

When to Upgrade

Like everything we use, our hearing devices have a finite lifespan. You should consider upgrading at certain times, even when everything seems to be working fine.

Typically, they'll last about three to six years. How long a hearing aid lasts depends on how well it's maintained, the device itself, and general wear and tear.

Most people only start thinking about replacing their hearing aids when they stop working reliably or stop working completely. However, that's not the only reason you should consider upgrading your hearing aid.

Emilia and her family had noticed she was not hearing well lately. She went to a provider and was disappointed that they were unable to help her.


